Now that voters have been registered, VOTE411 is operational, and voter guides have mostly been delivered, it is time to focus our efforts on Getting Out the Vote (GOTV). There are many possible approaches and the League is working in coalition with other groups who are using different strategies. Some groups are offering rides to the polls, others are knocking on doors in targeted neighborhoods. The League's primary approach is to have volunteers in high-traffic areas during the two weeks before the election, handing out VOTE411 bookmarks, asking people if they would like nonpartisan information about candidates and issues.

### REGISTRATION: EXPANDING THE POSSIBILITIES

In addition to registering more than 3,000 high school and college students this year, the League was involved with two new initiatives:

- Voter Service Director Marilyn Wilson and a group of volunteers visited ten senior citizen residences during the weeks prior to the registration deadline to assist residents with voter registration, changes of address, and applications for absentee ballots. These visits also provided opportunities to talk about the ballot issues and other items on the ballot. The visits were appreciated by staff and residents.
- On September 24th, LWVLA co-president Margo Smith joined volunteers from Michigan Power to Thrive, Michigan Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence and the Ingham County Clerk, Barb Byrum, to help 67 residents at the Ingham County Jail register to vote, update addresses, and apply for absentee ballots. Margo explains, "When I asked Sheriff Scott Wrigglesworth at a panel discussion for chiefs of police and sheriffs if he would allow the League of Women Voters to register detainees, he was receptive and asked me to come see him. Sheriff Wrigglesworth, his officers and deputies, developed a plan to bring 5 detainees at a time to meet us at an unused dormitory." Margo also notes that the residents ranged from youthful to elderly, men and women, and many were non-white. Residents were very respectful and appreciative. The chief deputy in the room explained that many detainees could not pay the bond fee and were waiting for their court

	Michigan is home to four Great Lakes and 11,000 inland lakes. Over half of our land area is forested and 25 percent is in crops or pastures. As such, it's no stretch to conclude that the health of our considerable natural resources is indispensable to our own economic health - and our public health! So, why not make your choice of candidates based on who will be the best steward

of Michigan's environment -- for you, your family and our future? It doesn't get bigger than that!

The League of Women Voters (LWV) is non-partisan and never endorses a party or candidate. However. LWV does study issues, develops consensus positions, and supports/opposes policies and proposed legislation. For each election, LWV works to aggregate candidate statements and platforms via a Voter's Guide, which is available online at VOTE411.org, to help voters make decisions based on the best available information. After inputting your specific address, you'll get a list of candidates seeking to represent you and the address of your polling place. There you can compare candidates based on their experience and their self-reported platforms relative to environmental issues.

You may also contact candidates directly via phone, email and social media with your specific questions about the environment and share the information with others. Attending public forums where you pose questions is another approach.

You might also query the websites of active environmental groups in Michigan. Here is a <u>link</u> to a list of active environmental groups.

The LWV's stated environmental aspiration is "to prevent ecological degradation, and to reduce and control pollutants before they go down the sewer, up the chimney or into the landfill." This is a large, encompassing target with tremendous benefit to all of us who live and love Michigan. Environmental change can only be done one step at a time. Certainly, choosing the candidate that best mirrors your priorities relative to the environment is a foundational step to that end. See you at the polls!
